We have an excellent reputation with program managers, government departments and ministries, and social and economic partners who never hesitate to support our projects and encourage us to pitch to them.

In 2023–2024, our CED financing was renewed. As a member of the SADC-CAE Network steering committee for negotiations, I was personally involved in the renewal process. I invested the time and energy required to achieve the best possible results. We are pleased to announce that we have secured five more years of financing, and would like to extend our thanks and recognition to Canada Economic Development for their trust and support in the SADC and CAE.

# **Executive Director's Remarks**

Time flies when you're surrounded by people with the same passion and dedication as you have for a mission. Thank you, I am proud to work with you all, our team is the basis of our success. To draw a line under our most recent strategic planning, the team has worked together to define our updated values, which now shape our interactions and collaborations.

Once again this year, we have invested close to \$800,000 in 17 local businesses through our two main funds. Ninety-five percent of clients (37/39) who received financing through the Regional Relief and Recovery Fund (RRRF) since the pandemic, repaid their loan in full before the deadline on March 28, 2024, and benefited from a partial write-off for early repayment (\$290,468).

As always, we strive to keep abreast of our clientele's needs, and this year noticed a significant increase in takeovers in the fishery sector. As such, we have implemented a new support model specifically catering to the fishery sector. I told you that the mentoring cell would surprise you this year, and true to my word, we launched a new group mentoring program. These two initiatives fall under our local development business line.

Again this year, we were granted redistributions from the SADC and CAE Network, for the Mesures d'Interventions Locales (MIL) and Virage Vert programs. We can and do make a difference! In fact, 20 participants received support through the 101 Project, and 30 participated in online training sessions with Skills in Action. I would like to extend my thanks to our partners for making this possible.









# Financing — Regional Relief and Recovery Fund (RRRF)

On September 14, 2023, the Government of Canada announced measures to give small businesses greater flexibility. The eligibility period to benefit from a partial write-off of loans granted through the RRRF-CF program was extended until March 28, 2024.

# 2023-2024 Community Development

**Local Economic Development (LED)** 

SADC financing contributes to many projects, fostering sustainable development across our territory and the development of our community's entrepreneurs. This stream is covered by our business lines and through mentoring.

\$44,213 invested in 7 projects

**Technical Assistance (TA)** 

Made-to-measure guidance, consultancy services and support for companies (including non-profit organizations), covering many spheres of entrepreneurship and business. In 2023–2024, one of the three supported projects was the second cohort of the 101 Project, which received 20 support sessions alone.

### Financial Management 101 16 hours

Customizable one-on-one support with an experienced consultant for small business owners and non-profit organizations. Teaches the purpose of financial statements, how to measure financial performance using data, how to compare financial statements with well-established models, and how to track numbers to better manage business overall and analyze projects based on financial data.

### **Bookkeeping 101 25-35 hours**

Customizable one-on-one support with an experienced consultant for small business bookkeepers and non-profit organizations. This course teaches how to immediately detect inconsistencies and gaps, track cash flow, sales, expenses, bank statements (reconciliation, etc.), payroll, and how to manage rebates, taxes and at source deductions.


